


Who We Are

The Santa Monica Mountains Fund is the National Park Service's official non-profit 501 (c)(3) fundraising partner for the mountains. We focus our efforts on education programs, wildlife research and protection, trails, habitat restoration, cultural resources, public information and stewardship. For the year that ended 9/30/17, we gave \$683,761 to programs such as Every Kid in a Park, mountain lion research and SAMO Youth.

Our Work Wildlife-

Red-legged frogs are back! The biologists' efforts to return red-legged frogs to the Santa Monica Mountains seem to have paid off, as at least one colony is now thriving in the park. This

follows several years of work to re-establish their breeding in the mountains. Supporting wildlife programs here continues to be an important part of the Fund's work providing genetic tests, satellite collars, cameras and administrative support to the team as they work to look after the park's many species.



So many Kids in the Park -

The Fund paid for the buses (with support from the National Park Foundation) that brought over 14,000 4th graders to the Santa Monica Mountains this year for the 'Every Kid in a Park' program. On their day of adventure and discovery in the mountains with NPS rangers the students tried out a range of activities. These included recording data about bugs, testing their tent pitching skills, finding out about the Chumash people and hiking in the hills. Some of them even earned their Junior Ranger badges!

SAMO Youth -

The Fund once again administered the SAMO Youth program that brought 22 young people from Oxnard and Los Angeles to work with the NPS this summer. They repainted picnic benches, built new fences, volunteered at school gardens, removed invasive plant species, carried out maintenance on miles of trails, hosted booths at the Night Sky family festival and maintained habitat on the Channel Islands.



Women honored for conservation – At SAMO

Fund's annual celebration this year we honored the 'founding mothers' of the Santa Monica Mountains – Sue Nelson, Margot Feuer and Jill Swift – along with 11 amazing women who have continued their extraordinary legacy of conservation in the park for nearly 40 years. They are fantastic role models for anyone who wishes to help preserve the mountains.
