Dollars Support Parks, Not Our Operations

Only 13.5% of the money we spent was for Santa Monica Mountains Fund operations.

A total of \$952,520 or 86.5% of our expenditures were in support of park programs and projects.

Significant amounts of our 2019 income have been held over for future years. NPS is working on plans for the five-year recovery process from the Woolsey Fire.

The reporting period in this leaflet is 1/1/19 to 12/31/19. These figures have not yet been audited.



Revitalizing the Nursery

Thanks to a grant from Metabolic Studio, the Fund has employed a new manager to upgrade the native plant nursery at Rancho Sierra Vista. New equipment is ensuring that healthy plants can now be produced to support habitat restoration throughout the mountains.



Open Outdoors for Kids

Despite the Woolsey Fire, the Open Outdoors for Kids program was able to continue. Nearly 20,000 4th graders enjoyed a fun day in the park learning about plants, animals and Native American heritage in the park. The Fund provided the buses to bring the kids from Title 1 schools in Los Angeles and Ventura counties for their day outdoors. This project was made possible by a grant from the National Park Foundation through the generous support of donors from across the country.




Who We Are

The Santa Monica Mountains Fund is the National Park Service's official non-profit 501(c)(3) partner for the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. As such, the Fund supports education programs, wildlife research and protection, trails and habitat restoration. It also helps protect cultural resources, provides public information about the mountains and encourages stewardship. For the year ending 12/31/19, the Fund allocated \$952,520 to programs such as Open Outdoors for Kids, wildlife research and SAMO Youth.

The Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area is the largest urban national park in the country. Extending over 50 miles from Point Mugu to the Hollywood Hills, the mountains reach right into L.A. This park is a biodiversity hotspot, as it is home to over 1,000 plant species, providing habitat for around 500 mammal, bird, reptile, and amphibian species.



Our Work



Woolsey Fire Recovery

In November 2018, the Woolsey Fire ripped through the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area decimating 88% of National Park Service owned land. Since then, SAMO Fund has been working with NPS to support the recovery. Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy awarded the Fund a grant to support the rebuild of Peter Strauss Ranch. And we have already secured nearly 25% of the \$1.1 million target to replace the movie sets at the destroyed Paramount Ranch. The Fund will also support the rebuilding of bridges on the Backbone Trail that were burnt in the fire with grants from REI and Ventura County Community Foundation. The support we have enjoyed since the Woolsey Fire has been incredible and we are so grateful.

SAMO Youth: 20th Anniversary

This year we celebrated the 20th anniversary of the SAMO Youth program. This brings 22 collegebound high school juniors and seniors on an intense youth mentoring journey with NPS rangers over the summer. We also employed xxx SAMO Youth alumni as junior leaders to support this year's cohort.



Mountain Lions and more

It's been a sad year for mountain lions, with several deaths due to rodenticide and on our highways. So, SAMO Fund donated \$75,000 to the NPS wildlife research program. The money is being used to support staffing, provide satellite collars and cameras so that biologists can track and understand the movement of these big cats. Thanks to volunteer support, the Fund also raised sufficient monies to replace the remote tracking cameras burnt in the Woolsey Fire. In addition, the Fund continues to support the #BreakThePoisonChain campaign by highlighting the risks of rodenticide to wildlife and pets.



Volunteers are the best!

Working with the National Park Service, the Fund provided support for a huge range of volunteer programs. Thanks to REI, we were able to help organize National Trails Day in June.
